## Men and Women – Equality in question

This morning, INSEE presented *Insee Références* "Men and women – Equality under the microscope" in the presence of its experts, Marie Reynaud, *Unit Head of the Demographic and Social Studies,* Laurence Rioux, *Head of the Social Studies Directorate,* Arnaud Dupray, *Head of Studies at Cereq,* and Adrien Papuchon, *Opinion Indicator Manager of the DREES.* 

In the overview, the publication describes the current situation of male and female pathways at **different ages in life** and the resulting **inequalities**. Women in recent generations are more qualified than men and there are now **fewer gender disparities** in the **labour market**.

However, single-parent situations, work interruptions related to children and part-time employment still concern more **mothers** than fathers, and women's wages remain lower.

## Two reports were presented during the conference

Male and female access to managerial positions at the start of their working life: convergence underway?

"For access to managerial positions, we are now seeing a convergence of situations between genders at the start of working life" Arnaud Dupray

In 2013, for the first time, the proportion of young women in employment and occupying a managerial position three years after completing their studies was the same as for young men (20%). Female labour conditions, and in particular wages, have drawn closer to those of men. Despite this, young women managers are more likely to work for a limited duration: 32% are on a fixed-term contract compared with 20% of male managers.

Social roles of men and women. The enduring idea of a maternal vocation for women despite the decline in adherence to gender stereotypes

The adherence to gender stereotypes and the gendered division of work are following a downward trend. In 2014, 22% of people interviewed still subscribed to the model of the housewife, compared with 43% in 2002. But the idea of a specific female "parental vocation" still endures among a significant proportion of the population: 1 in 5 people think that "ideally, women should stay at home to raise their children".

The publication also includes thirty or so themed information sheets which present essential data on gender inequalities from different perspectives (wage income, work/family articulation, contraception etc.)

## Publications across France to measure gender inequalities by region

In this publication, a special focus brings together a series of regional comparisons on gender equality. We learn, for example, that "single-parent situations are more common among women in Overseas Departments", or that "entering working life is much harder for women than for men in the South of France".

In addition, 17 regional studies explore further the issue of gender inequalities throughout life and present analyses which take account of the specific context in each region. In several cases, specific topics are explored such as the professional mix, retirement and equality in politics.
