The Families Survey is an extension to the census with questions about...

... family members who do not live with you: your children who live with their other parent, your grandchildren, your parents, etc.



... your personal family history:

when you left your parents' home, when you first got into a relationship, etc.

It's valuable!

For example, the most recent survey conducted in 2011 found that...

... mothers

... around **5**% of people aged 55 or older have never lived with a partner.



... on average, women become grandmothers at 54 and men become grandfathers at 56 years old.

If you'll be responding to the census ...



On paper

- Fill out the questionnaire(s) given to you by the census officer.
- Hand it/them back together with the census questionnaires.



Online

- Be sure to provide the right e-mail address when responding to the census.
- The next day, you'll receive an e-mail to **connect** to the Families Survey website. On this website, enter the username and password you used for the census, and fill out the questionnaire.

Your answers will be protected and kept confidential.

INSEE surveys are governed by a strict legal framework: French National Law, Act no. 51-711 of 7 June 1951 (amended) and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). To save you time, the information collected from you may be matched with administrative records to which INSEE has access.

Your responses and this information will be protected by statistical confidentiality and intended for INSEE.

They will only be used for statistical studies and will under no circumstances be used for control purposes. The census officer is bound by professional secrecy.

To understand why ...



... only women or only men will be interviewed in your household:

it's to take up less of your time. In other households, it'll be the other way around. The survey will cover both men and women.



... we ask about your first or last partner:

it's so we can find out, for example, how many people find a new partner after separation or the passing of their partner.



... we ask you questions about your parents:

it's so we can find out, for example, how many adults still have parents and how often they see them.
